Open for Business!

After five years of planning, designing and building,

Overlake’s new, five-story, 240,000 square-foot tower has opened its doors. Through Campaign FutureCare, contributions from our generous community have played an essential role in bringing the project forward. The completion of the new **East Tower** represents the end of the second phase of our three-phase campus renewal.

PHASE I

The Bob & Patty Edwards Cardiac and Vascular Operating Suite, including the Betty and Kemper Freeman Hybrid Operating Room and the Ron and Patty Bedient Cardiovascular Operating Room
(opened in 2019)

PHASE II

The New East Tower
(naming opportunity still available, opened in February 2021)

PHASE III

The Norcliffe Behavioral Health Unit
(opening in October, 2021)

The **East Tower** includes our new Childbirth Center as well as the Bob and Clodagh Ash Floor (Telemetry and Oncology Unit) and the Orthopedic and Spinal Surgery Unit. Our patients, families, staff, physicians and many community members provided inspiration and guidance for the vision and design of the building. *(See page 2 for more details.)*

The new East Tower, built with your help, is beautiful outside and inside. From the gracefully swooping forms of the Atsuhiko and Ina Goodwin Tateuchi Foundation Lobby to the spacious, private rooms, comfortable family gathering areas and curated art collection, the building feels welcoming for patients and visitors. The thoughtful design not only looks good, it helps create the best possible experience for patients and enables our hard-working caregivers to provide the compassionate care they are known for in a more efficient and healing environment.

Family-Centered

Although visits are currently restricted due to the pandemic, families will be welcomed once again when things return to normal. The East Tower has been designed to accommodate loved ones, with each room divided into three zones: patient, family and caregiver. Support from loved ones is critical for the healing process and for greeting new babies, and the East Tower's design ensures that visitors will feel like the valuable team members they are.

Neighborhoods of Care

Patient rooms in the East Tower cluster around a central nurse workstation. Patients and medical supplies are just steps away. This configuration ensures that nurses can see and check on all of their patients at a glance.

Specialized Care

New features include an obstetric emergency department for pregnant patients, an antepartum unit for moms-to-be who need medical supervision and additional neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) rooms that keep babies close to their moms.

Campaign FutureCare Continues

From the earliest days of the pandemic, Overlake caregivers have stood on the front lines. **YOU** stood with us, shoulder to shoulder.

While we worked to care for patients with the mysterious and terrifying new disease, our community pitched in.

FAMILIES AND BUSINESSES dropped off personal protective equipment. **RESTAURANTS** sent meals to keep our caregivers going. Those who were able sent donations.

SCHOOLCHILDREN sent cards with hand-drawn pictures to cheer us on. We are so grateful for your support.

With your help, Overlake has accomplished so much in the last year:

More than **2,000 COVID-19 patients** cared for in our hospital, emergency department and clinics.

Over 600 of those patients required inpatient care.

Childcare provided to ensure our staff could get to work to care for patients.

Involved in clinical trials from the beginning to help test therapeutic interventions for COVID-19 patients, including Remdesivir, which is now a standard treatment.

One of seven hospitals in the state identified by Medicare as high impact in the pandemic.

One of the earliest hospitals in the region to offer **antibody treatment**.

\$20 million in uncompensated COVID-related services provided. No patient is ever turned away.

On-site molecular testing lab opened 6.18.20.

The **lab operates 17 hours per day** and performs 130–200 tests each day.

The **average turnaround** for test results from our lab is six hours.

Overlake has provided **33,000+ vaccine doses** and counting.

Now providing vaccine doses at our **mass vaccination site** in Redmond as part of the King County Vaccination Partnership.

Overlake is committed to caring for and vaccinating our whole community.

THE JOHN AND REIKO SATO EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

The Sato family knows a thing or two about Overlake. **Three generations have benefited from our services**, from the emergency department to cardiology, orthopedic surgery and critical care. All five of Reiko Sato's grandchildren were born at Overlake. Through all of their experiences, they've been consistently impressed by the care, compassion and professionalism they experienced.

"We've always had excellent, caring staff members who went out of their way to help us, every time," says Ray Sato, Reiko's eldest son.

Those positive experiences, combined with their concerns about the community's well-being during the pandemic, led them to make an incredibly generous \$2.5 million gift in honor of the late John Y. Sato, the family patriarch. They have also agreed to lend their family name to Overlake's emergency department.

They chose the emergency department because the pandemic made round-the-clock emergency care more important than ever.

"We wanted our gift to help meet the community's greatest needs," Reiko explains.

A physician himself, Ray especially wanted to support Overlake's heroic staff. "I want to thank all the caregivers out there. They had a call to help people in the face of this deadly disease," he says. "We wanted to do what we could to help them with their mission."

COMING SOON!

The third and final phase of Project FutureCare has begun!

PHASE III takes place in three consecutive steps:

- 1. CONSTRUCTION** of the new Norcliffe Behavioral Health Unit on the top floor of Building 4.
- 2. DEMOLITION** of the old East Tower. Built in the 1970s, the building has served the community long and well, but it has been replaced by the new East Tower. We will say a grateful goodbye before the wrecking ball arrives in October.



- 3. CONSTRUCTION** of the Careage Connector, a glass-walled corridor that connects the two parts of the campus, makes it easier for everyone to find their way around and creates a beautiful entrance to welcome patients and visitors.

The facility now under construction will house Overlake's 14-bed inpatient Behavioral Health Unit with room for expansion in the future.
